ACADEMICS FOR THE 21st CENTURY AT MLCU

The new National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 at MLCU from 2020 for Undergraduate Degree Programmes

The Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India has designed a new blueprint for higher education in India. The new policy is based on a multidisciplinary approach of liberal education that provides a broad intellectual foundation to think critically, reason analytically, and communicate clearly. The NEP has emphasized the need for 21st century skills.

If higher education is to prepare students for life, for work and for becoming effective members of society, it is important to provide a holistic foundation of knowledge, skills, and values to view the world from

scientific, artistic, and humanistic angles. As someone has said, "Wisdom is infinite, but we take hold of a branch and think it is the whole tree."

These objectives recall the four pillars formulated by UNESCO in 1996.

- 1. Learning to know acquiring a body ofknowledge and learning how to learn, so as to benefit from the opportunities that education provides throughout life
- 2. Learning to do acquiring notonly an occupational skill but also the competence to deal with many situations and work in teams, and a package of skills that enables one todeal with the various challenges of working life
- 3. Learning to live together developing an understanding of other people and an appreciation of interdependence in a spirit of respect for the values of pluralism, mutual understanding and peace
- 4. Learning to developing one'spersonality and being able to act with autonomy, judgement and personal responsibility, while ensuring that education does not disregard any aspect of the potential of a person: memory, reasoning, aesthetic sense, physical capacities, and communication skills.

The NEP will be implemented in the university from the Academic Year 2020-2021. The curriculum of all departments for the undergraduate (UG) programmes has been planned as per the recommendations of the NEP. All UG programmes will now be of four years' duration, allowing the students to undergoan in-depth specialisation in the fourth year of their studies with an immersive internship and a research project in their specialisation. On completion of the fourth year of study, the student will be eligible for a lateral entry to the second year of a master's degree programme.

Students may note that they can also opt for an exit after three years of study and will still be awarded a degree under a three-year UG programme.

The subjects for the UG degree programme are divided into Core and Specialisation. The Core consists of 32credits which include elective subjects offered by each department to students from other departments during the 1stto 6th semesters. The Core also includes compulsory subjects such as English and Communication, Research Methods, Computer Fundamentals, and the Foundation Course. The specialisations are of two types, Major and Minor. The Major is the specialisation from the parent department of 38 credits, and the Minor of 12 credits is a secondary specialisation to be taken from another department.

WHO IS AN ALLIED HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONAL?

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare has recommended the following definition: "Allied health care professionals (AHPs) includes individuals involved with the delivery of health or healthcare related services, with qualifications and competence in therapeutic, diagnostic, curative, preventive and/or rehabilitative interventions. They work in multidisciplinary health teams in varied health care settings including doctors, nurses and public health officials to promote, protect, treat and/or manage a person('s) physical, mental, social, emotional, environmental health and holistic well-being. The scope of allied health practice extends to the individual, the family and to the community

MLCU became the first university in Northeast India to have a full-fledged department of allied health sciences when it established the Department of AHS in 2006. At present, the total number of graduates, to date, is 662. It has provided paramedical professionals for government and private hospitals and faculty members for several teaching institutions.

The Department of AHS follows the model curriculum developed by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare. Practical training of MLCU students is conducted at leading hospitals in Shillong and internship postings are arrangedat leading private and mission hospitals all over India.

Allied health workers are an untapped treasure, critical to fixing the gaping holes in India's health workforce, particularly the severe shortage of physicians and specialists. NIAHS.

DIPLOMA IN MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNOLOGY (DMLT)

DURATION: 2 years (four semesters) + six months internship

ELIGIBILITY: Class X pass

DMLT is a paramedical course which deals with various laboratory investigations. The subjects in the first semester are mainly basic sciences, and from the second to the fourth semester, pre-clinical and para-clinical subjects are taught. The programme covers basic knowledge and skills in biochemistry, microbiology, blood bank- ing, and pathology. Some of the tests that the technologists are trained to perform are blood typing, microorganism screening, bio-chemical analysis, cell counts, besides others.

DIPLOMA IN MEDICAL IMAGING TECHNOLOGY (DMIT)

DURATION: 2 years (four semesters) +six months' internship

ELIGIBILITY: Class X pass

Imaging technicians use cutting-edge technology and equipment to visualise the inside of the human body. The images they create help physicians diagnose and treat illnesses or injuries with greater accuracy. Technicians have a unique opportunity to work with some of the most advanced medical machinery available.

Eligibility: Class XII Science or lateral entry to 3rd semester (second year) after DMLT

The medical laboratory technologist is a key member of the healthcare team. Many laboratory tests are performed during routine health check-ups to confirm good health or to diagnose early signs of disease. The medical laboratory technologist performs lab tests that help in making the diagnosis and in deciding the treatment. This will help in determining the presence or absence of disease, the extent to which the disease has spread, and the effectiveness of treatment.

Students will be educated on basic medical sciences and trained to conduct a wide spectrum of medical laboratory tests. They will be taught to deal with a range of physiological and environmental factors that may have an impact on well-being and illness. The student will become familiar with the operational, quality and safety aspects of the laboratory. The medical laboratory technologist will be taught to perform tests in clinical pathology, blood banking, biochemistry, hematology, immunology, and microbiology as well as examine body fluids such as blood, sputum, urine, stools and cerebrospinal fluid. Students will also be trained to work with other health care professionals to enable patients to obtain the type of care most appropriate for them.

Medical imaging technologists are an important member of the healthcare team. In healthy patients, certain imaging tests are performed during routine health check-ups to confirm good health or to diagnose early signs of disease. In ailing patients, the medical imaging technologist performs procedures that help in making the diagnosis and in determining the treatment. Students will be educated in the basic medical sciences and trained to conduct a wide spectrum of imaging procedures like conventional x-ray, C-Arm, mammography, computerized tomography (CT), magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) and other modalities.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN SURGICAL & OPERATION THEATRE TECHNOLOGY (BSc SOTT)

DURATION: 4 years (6 semesters coursework with 1 year internship)

ELIGIBILITY: Class XII Science

Surgical and Operation Theatre technologists are an integral part of the hospital team that provides surgical, preop, and post-op care to patients in a variety of settings. Surgical technologists are integrated members of a surgical team who work in conjunction with the surgeon, anaesthesiologist, and nurse in order to provide quality care to the patient before, during, and after a surgery. They help to setup the operating room, surgical instruments, and other sterile supplies needed for the surgery. They are vital personnel who work side-by-side with the surgeon during a surgical procedure and may assist in the surgery under the supervision of a surgeon or a registered nurse.

A physician assistant (PhA) is a health professional who provides a broad range of health care services, that are traditionally performed by a doctor, under the supervision of a physician. Physician assistants exercise considerable autonomy in diagnosing and managing illnesses. They perform physical examinations, diagnose illnesses, develop and carry out treatment plans, order and interpret lab tests, suture wounds, assist in surgery, and provide preventive health care counselling. They may also take on managerial duties of supervising medical staff and ordering hospital supplies. Students will be trained in performing duties such as recording medical histories, examining and treating patients, ordering and analysing lab tests and x-rays, treating minor injuries, developing treatment plans, counselling patients and their families, performing minor procedures, and assisting in surgery.



Technology with Internship

The MSc MLT in Medical Microbiology is an allied health profession that specialises in microorganisms that cause disease. The role of the technologist in this field is to aid the doctor or medical microbiologist in detecting, diagnosing, and preventing diseases through clinical laboratory tests. In addition to running tests, technologists should also set up and maintain laboratory equipment. They also ensure that the laboratory is under the stipulated ambient conditions of temperature, humidity, quality control, safety, and sterility. The medical lab technician is trained to finish tasks with speed and accuracy, handle stress, make analytical judgments in interpreting technical or scientific data, use and maintain laboratory instrumentation, and become proficient in the use of computer hardware and software.

The MSc MLT in Clinical Biochemistry is an allied health profession concerned with the diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of diseases through clinical laboratory tests. Medical laboratory professionals play a critical role in collecting the information needed to give the best care to an ailing or injured patient. Lab technologists are vital members of healthcare as the practice of modern medicine would be difficult without the tests performed in the laboratory.

Clinical biochemists specialise in diagnostics and therapeutics using their knowledge of biochemical and physiological functions of the human body. Owing to the increasing awareness among the general masses about health and hygiene and the mushrooming healthcare facilities and hospitals, the demand for such trained professionals is ever increasing and the programmes contributes to the effort to bridge the gap between demand and availability of these professionals.



Using new imaging techniques, the imaging technologist can help in quicker and more accurate diagnosis of illness. Being vital members of the healthcare team, the postgraduates in medical imaging technology will be experts in the operational, quality and safety aspects of the radiological diagnostic service equipment like CT (Computerized Tomography) and MRI (Magnetic Resonance Imaging).



OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRAMME


The World Health Organization adopted public health (PH) as a core strategy of Universal Health Coverage (UHC) in 2017 and the Government of India had declared UHC as a goal to be achieved by 2022. Despite significant achievements over the past decade, public health challenges continue to prevail in India and in the world.

While old threats continue to challenge health systems, new issues and challenges have appeared that burden the health systems. Creation of a dedicated Public Health Cadre has been identified as one of the important pre-requisites in moving towards improving health systems. Public health professionals help in bridging the gap between the clinical and managerial aspects of the program implementation and provide techno-managerial inputs.

Public health programs demand a special emphasis on the study of disease epidemiology, various determinants of health and emerging challenges in health, public policy making, and program management.

The Bachelor's degree in PH (BPH) course will attempt to prepare a competent cadre of professionals who have a basic understanding of the various aspects of public health and are able to apply this knowledge towards meeting public health challenges in the Indian context.

Candidates can also opt for an integrated MPH programme that allows BPH students to earn a Master of Public Health (MPH) degree in five calendar years of full-time academic study.



OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAMME

In keeping with our mission to develop a public health workforce for India, this course aims to develop and strengthen the public health workforce and to develop capacity in health care leadership and management in northeast India.

- 1. To develop knowledge, analytical skills and attitudes pertinent to public health
- 2. To develop leadership and management skills in public health



OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRAMME

The Master of Science in Biostatistics & Epidemiology course will prepare students in biostatistical methods for study design, data analysis, statistical reporting, data management, statistical reasoning and reporting. Graduates of the programme will be prepared for careers as biostatisticians in a variety of professional environments including government, academics, healthcare, research organizations and industry.

Biostatistics involves the theory and application of statistical science to address issues in health sciences, including medicine and public health. It uses quantitative research methods for analysing health problems. Epidemiology is the study of the distribution and determinants of health-related states or events (including disease), and the application of this study to the control of diseases and other health problems. It is a quantitative discipline built on the research disciplines of probability science and statistics. It involves methods of causal reasoning based on developing and testing hypotheses pertaining to the occurrence and prevention of morbidity and mortality. Methods developed by biostatisticians adepidemiologists are used to plan population

surveys and to optimally design interventions to collect data which allow valid conclusions to be drawn. Biostatisticians and epidemiologists play a role in designing research studies, monitoring data quality, analysing data, interpreting the results and making inferences based on the data.

During the programme, students will also be exposed to fields of study in English Literature and Linguistics.

MASTER of ARTS in ENGLISH LITERATURE

ABOUT THE PROGRAMME

The prime focus of the Masters of Arts in English Literature programme is to study culture vis-à-vis literature and to train students in the knowledge of literary theories as necessary tools to read narrative texts from various ideological perspectives. The engagement of colonialism with literary culture in India is too deep andinvasive for the disciplinary expansion of English pedagogy to be studied with Britain as the only or chief focus.

Understanding the curriculum as an 'activity' rather than a repertoire of texts, this course aims to help students study texts in the context of the imperialist mission of western hegemony. In light of this, the course structure encourages a sustained cross-referencing between histories of England and its colonies, thereby instilling a sense of appreciation of a people, their cultural beliefs, lifestyles, traditional practices, and forms of expression reflected through literary art forms. Indigenous literature, written in or translated to English, thus constitutes a major aspect of the course for a systematic and critical study of local cultures and aesthetics which otherwise, have been rather understudied, underappreciated and misrepresented in hegemonic narratives.

MASTER of ARTS in LINGUISTICS

DURATION: 2 years (four semesters) ELIGIBILITY: Any bachelor's degree

ABOUT THE PROGRAMME

Linguistics is the study of human languages, concerned with the nature of language and communication. It deals both with the study of particular languages and the search for general properties common to all languages or groups of languages. The study follows a scientific approach. It is also referred to as Linguistic Science.

Linguistics includes explorations into the nature of language variations, that is, dialects, language change over time, how language is processed and stored in the brain, and how it is acquired by young children. The focus of Linguistics is about the structure, use and psychology of language in general rather than the ability to speak many languages.

ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT

The Department was established in 2012 with a postgraduate programme in Environment and Social Development. In 2016, the Department introduced BSc in Environmental Sciences and BA in Environmental Studies.

The fact that environmental studies is multidisciplinary in nature and is intricately woven into thelives of tribal and indigenous people has led to special importance being accorded to traditionalknowledge, culture and environment, and folklore.

The Department has also been engaging in the documentation of Khasi, Jaintia and Garo traditional medicine. To this end, it has been able to build an active networking with the traditional healers' community. The Department was also instrumental in drafting the Khasi Hills Autonomous District (Protection and Promotion of Khasi Traditional Medicine) Act, 2011 of the Khasi Hills District Autonomous Council, Meghalaya.

At present the Department is focused on undertaking studies and research work in the field of surface archaeology, speleology, paleontology, waste management, and land reclamation and traditional knowledge in weather forecasting, biodiversity conservation. These research areas were selected with the objective of heritage conservation.

The Department presently offers Master of Science in Environmental Sciences (MSc ES) and Bachelor of Science in Environmental Science (BSc ES).


ABOUT THE COURSE

At present, 62 million tonnes of waste is generated annually in the country, out of which about 75-80 per cent ofthe municipal waste gets collected and only 22- 28 per cent of this waste is processed and treated. Waste to resource has been a concept in place butthe actual implementation in India is still very limited. There is a huge market that can be tapped through entrepreneurship. As per the Waste to Energy and Waste Management Market in India -2019 Report it is expected that the Indian garbage will offer business opportunity of USD 14 billion by 2025, which is set to unlock new businessavenues in the waste treatment industry.

Needless to say, that waste management and social entrepreneurship is a win-win approach and a way forward. 



DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY (PhD)

DOCTOR OF MINISTRY

DURATION: 3 years

ELIGIBILITY: B.D/MDiv or its equivalent from a recognised university/board.

Doctor of Ministry (DMin) is a professional degree designated to enrich Christian leadership and to deepen their understanding and commitment to ministry as well as to refine their practice. It provides women and men with the opportunity to pursue advanced studies in Christian life and Ministry by research in the context of professional practice with supporting specialised coursework.

PhD

DURATION: 3 years

ELIGIBILITY: MTh or its equivalent from a recognised university/board.

The PhD programme consists of Coursework and an independent thesis.

DMIN TO PhD

A candidate with a DMin may pursue a PhD that will take a minimum of one year, provided the research study is based on, or a continuation of the DMin research project.


REGISTRATION AND MEMBERSHIP


VISION

ABOUT MARTIN LUTHER CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY

CREATION OF THE UNIVERSITY

Martin Luther Christian University was created by Act No. 11 of 2005 of the Legislative Assembly of Meghalaya and received the assent of the Governor on July 6, 2005. The Government of Meghalaya issued the gazette notification on February 22, 2006. The creation of the university is in accordance with the University Grants Commission (UGC) Act, 1956 under Section 2(f) and the university is empowered to grant degrees under Section 22 of the UGC Act.

MLCU is recognised by the UGC vide a notification and the University has been granted Reg. No. 284.

Several students and graduates of MLCU have been awarded JRF, NET and merit scholarships by the UGC. Many graduates of MLCU are pursuing their higher studies in universities and institutions in different parts of the country and abroad.

THE FIRST CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY

Martin Luther Christian University is the first full-fledged Christian University in India, the capstone to more than two centuries of Christian education in this country. As a Christian university, MLCU has the mandate, mission and commitment to engage proactively with the Christian community, especially youth, Christian educational institutions and Christian organizations.

A DEVELOPMENTAL UNIVERSITY

The University recognises its opportunity and responsibility to contribute to the sustainable development of Meghalaya and the Northeast region, participating not only in higher education, but also in vocational education, health care, information and communication networks, environmental conservation, gender studies, cultural documentation, peace building and interventional projects. The University collaborates with NGOs, community organisations, and industry in the development of the community.

THE NAME

The University is named after Martin Luther (1483-1546), a church reformer who is known as the Father of Protestantism. Though Martin Luther left law studies to become a monk, his enlightened views on education are quoted to this day. He was especially concerned about "parents who do not have the opportunity or means to educate their children". His sermon on "Keeping children in schools" later published as a treatise, focused on low-income families who needed their children to work rather than go to school. He laid emphasis on the establishment and maintenance of Christian Schools in response to a decline in the church run schools in the 16 century.

THE EMBLEM

The University Emblem comprises of the *Knup*, the Cross and the Hearth. The *Knup* is a traditional woven bamboo cane cape used as a protection against rain when working in the fields or out in the open. The *Knup* symbolises protection and nurture in the journey through hardship to gain knowledge. In the centre of the Knup, is the Cross which is the symbol of Christianity and denotes sacrifice and endurance. At the base of the *Knup* is the Hearth with burning fire which occupies an important place in tribal houses. It is a place where parents and elders gather to instruct, narrate stories and sing songs while imparting the cultural and traditional knowledge of the forefathers to the younger generation.

THE MOTTO

Noted poet, historian and archeologist George Fabricius (1516-1571) eulogised the Protestant Reformist, Martin Luther as "The Light of Truth." Martin Luther Christian University's motto has emerged from this praise of the Father of Protestantism. According to Fabricius, truth is a light that illuminates, educates and edifies.

THE MISSION STATEMENT

To contribute to the sustainable development of Meghalaya and Northeast India, by providing knowledge, skills and values that will enable our students to become global citizens, while upholding gender, ethnic and religious equity for all, conserving its bio-cultural heritage and byrecognising its Christian legacy and commitment.

VISION

Christian education and values for the betterment of society, especially its youth and Christian community.

The Vision of the University has encapsulated the mandate and commitment of the Founders of the University, which have been recorded verbatim in the Minutes of the first meeting of the Board of Governors and is extracted as below: "The role and responsibility of the church is to transform society in a manner that is relevant in today's context. The process of transformation must come about in such a way that it solves the problems of unemployment among young people, poverty, health, education and development. The university has come at the right time and should help our people to help themselves. Our state has rich potential in nature and the university should help to tap these resources in a proper way. The university should be rooted in the local culture."

"The university should help to define the role of the church in this society. It should serve the people of Meghalaya. Historically, the church has provided school and higher education in Meghalaya, but the university will be the crown of our educational efforts in Meghalaya. The praxis of faith, grace and scripture is education."





ACADEMIC POLICIES AND PRINCIPLES

A. PROGRAMMES

The diploma and degree programmes that MLCU offer are livelihood, career, and entrepreneurial centred. They are oriented to the developmentneeds of the state, region, and country.

CURRICULUM AND PEDAGOGY

The curriculum is experiential, not didactic, dynamic, not static, and competency-based rather than theoretical. It de-emphasises lectures and examinations and instead provides complementary knowledge and skills. It is oriented to the context of indigenous history, culture, and issues. It also seeks to create awareness and stimulate advocacy and community activity. It offers foundation course, minors, specialisations and a multi-disciplinary liberal education approach. The University has also adopted the Blended Learning approach.

STUDENT CENTRED The academic programmes emphasise learning rather than teaching and provides students with hands-on experiences. It acknowledges their individual differences, backgrounds, and abilities. The University uses multiple an innovative method of learning and provides a friendly and supportive environment. The academic assessment of student learning is achieved by continuous formative evaluation to shift the focus from assessment of learning to assessment for learning. Career guidance and career preparation are provided. For student support a Deanship for students is available

RESEARCH

The research is community-based and relevant to the development of society. Emphasis is given to interventional, community-participative programmes, cultural rootedness and the revitalisation of indigenous knowledge so as to benefit and strengthen traditional, transitional, and contemporary communities.

ACADEMIC STRUCTURES

The University follows a two-semester academic calendar. The syllabus is delivered in the form of credits and the evaluation of students uses grades and grade point average.



B. CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)

In line with UGC recommendations, the University follows the Choice Based Credit System for all undergraduate students. Under CBCS students choose a Minor (12 credits) from another department.

C. FOUNDATION COURSE

Life span development is the field of study that examines patterns of growth, change and stability in behaviour that occur throughout an individual's lifespan. Lifespan development focuses on human development and views development as a continuous, lifelong process. Lifespandevelopment uses a scientific approach to understanding human growth and change throughout life and encompasses physical, cognitive, social, and personality development. Culture and ethnicity also play an important role in development, that is, both culture in the broad sense and aspects of culture, such as race, ethnicity, and socio-economic status.

The period of young adulthood is characterised by:

- potential for high performance, more than at any other stage of life. It also highlights the role and importance of cultural learning as an example of lifelong development.
- physical development of puberty that is completed during this phase. Health and fitness are often a concern, including attention to proper nutrition, junk foods, and overweight.
- experimentation with and usage of drugs and drinking are often a feature of new-found independence. Efforts to enhance mental and psychological well-being are important to reduce inherent stresses of this phase of life.
- the expansion of the networks of friendships as new social relationships are made away from home. These friendships sometimes become more important than family in the maintenance of sound mental health. Shared altruism and idealism may lead to group volunteerism, strengthening social integration.
- moral reasoning and ethical codes that reach the highest stage of development between 20-22 years of age.
- ethnicity, identity and growing awareness of one's cultural roots that result in a healthy balance of cultural self-confidence, respect for diversity, and a complete sense of self.
- heterosexual relationships. In MLCU, a study has shown that more than half of students are in a relationship. There are prejudices or openness about issues such as pornography, premarital sex, abortion, rape, and alternative sexual orientations, depending on upbringing and the influences of religion, peers, and media. Concerns arise about contraception, sexually-transmitted diseases, and sexual harassment.
- Career decision-making including the need to select disciplines of study and specialisations. Cultural, social and gender beliefs influence the choice of careers, as does peer influences. Goals in life need to be formulated so that study choices are aligned accordingly.



The Foundation Course will provide awareness and engagement with all these issues that young adults face and will provide academic, social, and psychological support during this important phase of life and university education.

D. EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Knowledge is effectively created through experience. Knowledge results from the combination of grasping and transforming experience. It is distinct from rote or didactic learning, in which the learner plays a comparatively passive role. The University Grants Commission encouragesthe use of experiential learning stating that, "Learners must have ample scope to formulate their own queries and have multiple interpretations of knowledge through self-search and experiential learning." To emphasise the importance of experiential learning, MLCU encourages the broad use of experiential strategies and tools, recommending that at least half of the learning time be spent in experiential learning.

E. SELF-DIRECTED LEARNING (SDL)

The UGC Guidelines for Master's degrees has the following provision: "The students shall be encouraged to study some part of the syllabus themselves and shall be given assignments, so as to make use of the library, laboratory, internet and such other faculty." Self-learning is any study form in which individuals have primary responsibility for planning, implementing, and even evaluating the effort. Most people preferself-learning to teacher-directed learning. In self-directed learning:

Individual learners become empowered to take more responsibility for decisions associated with learning

- 1. Self-direction creates a continuum of learning
- 2. Self-learning can take place in collaboration with others
- 3. Self-directed learners are able to transfer learning from one situation to another
- 4. Self-directed learning can effectively be conducted through various activities: self-guide dreading,
- 5. participation in study groups, internships, electronic dialogues, and reflective writing
- 6. Effective roles for teachers are possible: dialogue with learners, helping with sources and resources, promoting critical thinking and evaluating outcomes



- 7. Innovative programmes maybe created/conducted such as: individualised study options, non-traditional course offerings, open learningprogrammes, computer-mediated instruction and others.
- 8. "Most important of all, self-directed learning works!"

Self-directed learning, in its broadest meaning, describes a process in which individuals take the initiative, with or without the help of others, indiagnosing their learning needs, formulating learning goals, identifying resources for learning, choosing and implementing learning strategies, and evaluating learning outcomes.

In self-directed learning, learners themselves take the initiative to use resources rather than simply reacting to transmissions from resources, which helps them learn more and in a better way. Lifelong, self-directed learning (SDL)has been identified as an important ability for raduates. It has been shown through manystudiesworldwidethattheself-directedmethodisbetterthantheteachercentricmethodoflearning. Teacher-directed learningmakeslearnersmoredependentandtheorientationtolearningbecomessubject-centred. If a teacher provides the learning material, the student is usually satisfied with the available material, whereas if a student is asked to work on one's own, he or she invariably has to explore extensive resources on the subject.

F. EXTERNAL INTERNSHIPS

As part of experiential learning, internships are encouraged and supported in MLCU in that all departments have internships. The strongest internship programme in terms of duration and learning is in the AHS department. Most AHS students havefound the internship to be a personal and professional transformative experience. A transformative experience will best come about from an immersive internship which serves several purposes:

- a. Experience in hands-on skills
- b. Develop attributes of confidence, maturity, and agency
- c. Demonstrate analytical, critical reflection, and decision-making skills
- d. Develop interactive skills with other professionals in the field
- e. Become more familiar with the world of work
- f. Obtain cross-cultural experiences



"External internship" is one that is conducted away from the place of student origin. It may include internships that have been arranged by individual students, but generally will encompass a group of institutions and organisations with which MLCU has established a formal relationship. These arrangements will be academically and administratively structured for optimal learning experience.

G. CONTINUOUS FORMATIVE EVALUATION (CFE)

Continuous formative evaluation refers to any form of frequent assessment, such as tests, essays, projects, interviews, or presentations that are conducted during the course with the goal of giving students early and continuous feedback on their performance, so as to help the student correct gaps and improve during the semester. In contrast, summative evaluation is a final evaluation about the quality of performance conducted at the end of the course, such as a final examination. CFE is used at MLCU.

H. RESEARCH

Through evidence-based research, the University can develop innovations in enhancing pedagogy within the university and the initiatives in the community. As the university focuses on upholding the heritage and culture of our students, the Research Office has laid emphasis on documentation of valuable indigenous knowledge systems and cultural practices that are in danger of decline and extinction. The Research Office would also look at translating culturally important documents of various tribes which could then be widely disseminated. Although the research studies undertaken are of local problems and concerns, the findings and their implications should be applicable to a wider audience at the national and the international level.



STUDENT SERVICES

CAREER COUNSELLING

Career Counselling facilitates students to explore the world of employment and career avenues and assist them in career planning. They gather information about their interests, aptitudes, and abilities so that they can choose their careers more effectively. It provides students with a platform to meet experienced professionals in relevant fields and learn, through listening and interacting, they chart out their career path and long-term goals. Career Counselling thus serves to effectively match and balance the personal abilities, interests, and situation soft he student with the external factors of employability and courses thus helping them prioritise and choose the best available option. Career counselling programmes are conducted every semester and are provided to all students.

COUNSELLING CELL

Martin Luther Christian University is committed to the holistic development of students. The Counselling Cell provides support to the students in the areas of their academic development as well as their personal issues. Students are encouraged to attend counselling sessions as and when needed in order to overcome challenges that they may have with confidence, courage, integrity and various others. The Counselling Cell aims to equip students with skills to transform adversities into opportunities for excellence.

GENDER STUDIES, REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND LIFE SKILLS EDUCATION

Life skills have been defined by the World Health Organization as 'the abilities for adaptive and positive behaviour that enable individuals to deal effectively with the demand and changes of everyday life'. These skills help to promote social, emotional and mental well-being and competency for young people to face the realities of life. Life Skills include communication and listening skills; negotiation and refusal skills; decision-making and problem-solving skills; and coping and self-management skills. Students trained in these areas display an improved self- esteem and the ability to manage feelings and stress.

The International Guidelines on Sexuality Education (UNESCO, 2009) defines sexuality education as "an age-appropriate, culturally sensitive and comprehensive approach to sexuality education that includes scientifically accurate, realistic and non-judgmental information." Comprehensive sexuality education provides opportunities to explore one's own values and attitudes and to build

decision-making, communication, and risk reduction skills on aspects of sexuality. Comprehensive sexuality education promotes critical thinking, self-actualisation, and behavioural change through knowledge about the body, healthy sexuality, relationships, sex abuse, pregnancy, HIV and sexually transmitted infection prevention; and many other topics in human sexuality and sexual and reproductive health and rights.

MLCU conducts a workshop on "Gender studies, reproductive health and life skills education" for all undergraduate and postgraduate students. The workshop is held over four days. The course is broadly divided into three sections, namely gender, reproductive health, and life skills education. The life skills team consists of certified facilitators from health, social work, and psychology background.

LIBRARY

The University has both Central and Departmental libraries. The main library is housed in the main campus and is accessible to all the students and staff of MLCU and the departmental libraries are located in the respective departments and accessible to students and staff of those departments. The Library is equipped with computers and internet facilities for the students to browse for reading materials related to their studies. It also has photo copying and spiral-binding facilities. The University subscribes to JSTOR, a digital library for scholars, researchers, and students through which over 10 million academic journals, books, articles, and primary sources in 75 disciplines can be accessed.

MLCU SCHOLARSHIPS

MLCU offers various Merit-Cum-Means Scholarships to its students and has set up what is known as the MLCU Scholarship Fund (MLCUSF). The objective of the MLCUSF is to provide financial assistance to MLCU students on a merit-cum-means basis. To be eligible for a scholarship, a student must be registered in a full-time degree or diploma course and should have completed at least one year of the course. Regular attendance and academic progress are also taken into consideration when determining the award of scholarship. There are 30 scholarships offered every year from the MLCU Scholarship Fund. ADMISSION POLICY

According to the MLCU Act 2005, Section 9, "The University shall be open to all persons irrespective of class, caste, creed, religion, language or gender, provided that nothing in this section shall be deemed to require the University from making special provisions for admission to students of the State."

In accordance with the Act, the University shall admit:

- Students from a wide diversity of backgroundsirrespective of class, caste, creed, religion, language or gender
- Students from a variety of academic backgrounds who have studied in government, private, church and other religious schools and from varying levels of academic performance
- At no time shall admissions be made purely on academic merit but shall take into consideration also issues of diversity and social and academic marginalization anddeprivation
- Students from the state of Meghalaya and the Northeast region shall ordinarily be given preference. All admissions to MLCU are based primarily on the following criteria:
 - 1. Fulfilling the minimum eligibility required to pursue undergraduate and postgraduate studies.
 - 2. The admission is on a first come first serve basis (Spot Admission).
 - 3. No percentage is set up as a criterion for admissions to the courses in MLCU at both UG and PG levels.
- Provisional admission may be granted, which gives the opportunity to students who are unable to fulfill admission criteria as below:
 - 1. If applicants are unable to submit the requireddocuments at the time of admission
 - 2. If original documents have not been presented for verification.

LATERAL ENTRY ADMISSION

- Awaiting final semester/final year results Awaiting their degree certificates/other academic documents
- Students who have a minimum number of failures in the qualifying examination and are re-appearing. These will be considered on an individual basis.
- Paid the fees partially This is applicable for a period of six months to one year. During this period, applicants are to fulfill the deficiency failing which their registration will be temporarily suspended or cancelled as applicable. After the period has lapsed, applicants are to submit an application indicating reasons of inability to fulfill the conditions for further consideration and decision about continuation or termination.

• In cases where applicants do not complete the standard +2 (Arts, Science, Commerce) courses of studies, admissions to undergraduate programmes may be considered based on 12 years of relevant education. Admissions to postgraduate programmes may be given on the basis of completion of 10+2+3 years' duration of relevant studies.

POLICY FOR LATE ADMISSIONS

- Understanding that the students often have valid reasons for late applications, the University recommends the following policy for late admissions:
 - 1. Regular admissions shall be continued till 30 days after the first day of classes
- 2. After the close of admissions and up to thirty days, students may be admitted with the following provisions:
- a. Students shall be admitted with a specific undertaking that it may not always be possible for the student to catch up with classes, in spite of extra academic support and in which case the University will not be held liable
- b. These students will be mentored by individual faculty member(s) to catch up their academic work
- c. Students will undergo counselling if required
- d. Payment of a fee as per the number of hours for extra classes required. The number of hours will be determined by HOD in consultation with the faculty of the department
- e. The faculty member(s) will be paid according to the University policy for extra classes
- f. A log of the supplementary learning and CFE will be maintained and signed by the student, faculty member and HOD and forwarded to the Dean Academics for academic and administrative processing
- g. She/he may be permitted to proceed to the second Semester according to the Promotion Policy of the University
- Late admissions may be permitted after two months of the first day of classes with the approval of the Vice Chancellor and subject to para 2 above
