Paremen




In the meadows of Shillong, where the hills looked like sleeping giants, a little girl walked along the soft grass, her tiny hands picking flowers as she went.

They ran back to the village and told their parents about the strange woman in the cave.






News about the mysterious lady quickly spread throughout the villages.

in the hills."






Her husband and children were sad but they knew she had to leave.

She blessed them and returned to her cave, where she disappeared forever.


Her children grew up to be wise leaders, just as Pahsyntiew had promised.





Note to the Grown-Ups

Here are a few ways you can help your child engage more with the story!

Make Reading Time Special



Create a cozy, quiet space where you can read together without distractions. Soft lighting or a comfy blanket can set the mood, making it feel like a reading adventure!

Bring the Story to Life



Use different voices and expressions for each character to make the story more fun and engaging. Encourage interaction by asking questions like, "What do you think will happen next?" or "How would you feel if you were in the story?"



Encourage Creativity

After reading, ask your child to draw their favorite part of the story or imagine what happens next. You can also create your own version of the tale, adding new characters or twists together!



Explore Nature

Take your child on a nature walk and ask them to notice and pick their favorite flowers, just like the little girl in the story. A visit to Krem Marai will also help connect the themes of the book with their surroundings.



Build Vocabulary Together

When you come across new words, pause to explain them in a way that's easy to understand. For example, "A 'maiden' is a young woman." This builds their vocabulary while keeping the story engaging.



Listen to Your Child's Thoughts

Let your child ask questions or point out details in the illustrations that interest them. Every observation, no matter how small, adds to their enjoyment. Let them take the lead and value their ideas!



Creative Arts Fun

Encourage your child to create something based on the story—a drawing of Pahsyntiew, her cave, or the hills. This adds a hands-on activity that deepens their connection to the story.
