DMLT is a paramedical course which deals with various laboratory investigations. The subjects in the first semester are mainly basic sciences, and from the second to the fourth semester, pre-clinical and para-clinical subjects are taught. The programme covers basic knowledge and skills in biochemistry, microbiology, blood banking, and pathology. Some of the tests that the technologists are trained to perform are blood typing, micro-organism screening, bio-chemical analysis, cell counts, besides others.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNOLOGY (BSc MLT]

DURATION :3 years (six semesters) + 1 year internshipELIGIBILITY :+ 2 with science or lateral entry to second year after DMLT

The medical laboratory technologist is a key member of the healthcare team. Many laboratory tests are performed during routine health check-ups to confirm good health or to diagnose early signs of disease. The medical laboratory technologist performs lab tests that help in making the diagnosis and in deciding the treatment. This will help in determining the presence or absence of disease, the extent to which the disease has spread, and the effectiveness of treatment.

Students will be educated on basic medical sciences and trained to conduct a wide spectrum of medical laboratory tests. They will be taught to deal with a range of physiological and environmental factors that may have an impact on well-being and illness. The student will become familiar with the operational, quality and safety aspects of the laboratory. The medical laboratory technologist will be taught to perform tests in clinical pathology, blood banking, biochemistry, hematology, immunology, and microbiology as well as examine body fluids such as blood, sputum, urine, stools and cerebrospinal fluid. Students will also be trained to work with other health care professionals to enable patients to obtain the type of care most appropriate for them.

Medical imaging technologists are an important member of the healthcare team. In healthy patients, certain imaging tests are performed during routine health check-ups to confirm good health or to diagnose early signs of disease. In ailing patients, the medical imaging technologist performs procedures that help in making the diagnosis and in determining the treatment. Students will be educated in the basic medical sciences and trained to conduct a wide spectrum of imaging procedures like conventional x-ray, C-Arm, mammography, computerized tomography (CT), magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) and other modalities.

Surgical and Operation Theatre technologists are an integral part of the hospital team that provides surgical, pre-op, and post-op care to patients in a variety of settings. Surgical technologists are integrated members of a surgical team who work in conjunction with the surgeon, anaesthesiologist, and nurse in order to provide quality care to the patient before, during, and after a surgery. They help to setup the operating room, surgical instruments, and other sterile supplies needed for the surgery. They are vital personnel who work side-by-side with the surgeon during a surgical procedure and may assist in the surgery under the supervision of a surgeon or a registered nurse.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT (BSc PHA)

DURATION:3 years (six semesters) + 1year internship.ELIGIBILITY:+2 with science

A physician assistant (PhA) is a health professional who provides a broad range of health care services, that are traditionally performed by a doctor, under the supervision of a physician. Physician assistants exercise considerable autonomy in diagnosing and managing illnesses. They perform physical examinations, diagnose illnesses, develop and carry out treatment plans, order and interpret lab tests, suture wounds, assist in surgery, and provide preventive health care counselling. They may also take on managerial duties of supervising medical staff and ordering hospital supplies.Students will be trained in performing duties such as recording medical histories, examining and treating patients, ordering and analysing lab tests and x-rays, treating minor injuries, developing treatment plans, counselling patients and their families, performing minor procedures, and assisting in surgery.

CAREER PROSPECTS

Employment of physician assistants is projected to grow rapidly in the coming years. The expansion of the healthcare sector and an emphasis on cost containment results in increasing demand for physician assistants by healthcare establishments. Career opportunities for physician assistants are seen both in urban and rural areas.



BACHELOR OF OPTOMETRY (BOPTOM)

DURATION:3 years (six semesters) + 1 year internshipELIGIBILITY:+2 with science

Optometry deals with the examination, diagnosis, and management of refractive errors. Optometrists examine eyes and treat eyesight problems by prescribing medication, eyeglasses, contact lenses, vision therapy, or rehabilitation programmes. Besides these, they also carry out diagnosis and appropriate referral for patients.

CAREER PROSPECTS

Eyesight problems such as cataracts and macular degeneration tend to occur more frequently later in life, so an aging population will lead to more demand for optometrists. The growing number of people with diabetes, which has been linked to increased rates of eye conditions, has led to the need for more optometrists to monitor, detect, and refer individuals with chronic conditions stemming from diabetes. Most health plans cover medical eye care and many cover preventive eye exams. Hence, more optometrists will be needed to provide these services.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN SPORTS, NUTRITION, AND FITNESS

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DURATION:3 years (six semesters) + 1 year internshipELIGIBILITY:+2 with science or any other stream (those from other streams will have a to take a bridge course in science)

This programme in Fitness, Sports and Nutrition is introduced to meet the industry requirements for physical fitness, sports management, and nutrition professionals. The course will provide a scientific overview of fitness and nutrition with the goal of improving intensive sports performance and prevention of various health problems. The course also focuses on promoting fitness and sports nutrition programmes, centres and research. It also prepares sportspersons to become trainers and coaches.

As nutritional science has its roots in biological sciences, an application of the principles of nutrition to promote positive health calls for an understanding of both biological and social sciences. The role of nutrition in enhancing the quality of life through improved physical growth, development and productivity and improved immune competence have all been studied and continue to be interesting areas of investigation. At the same time, translation of these basic nutritional facts into practice requires an understanding of the dietary patterns and the influence that social, economic, and cultural factors have on them. The chemistry of food and changes in nutrient content during food processing are equally important in understanding the science of nutrition.

The course is designed in a way that provides an understanding of both the biological and social science perspectives. The students will receive both basic theoretical and practical training for two years and subsequently undertake professional elective courses in the areas of Clinical Nutrition & Dietetics and Food Processing & Nutrition. Those graduates who meet the eligibility requirements may take the Registered Dieticians examination of the Indian Dietetic Association.

MASTER OF SCIENCE IN MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNOLOGY (MSc MLT GENERIC)

DURATION: 3 years (5 semesters + 6 months internship) Bachelor's degree in any life science discipline or 3 year and with 4 years ELIGIBILITY: BSc MLT: 2 years

The role of a medical technologist is to assist doctors in the diagnostic process of identifying patients' illnesses and deals with the treatment and prevention of diseases through clinical laboratory tests. This course aims to produce laboratory technicians who are academically sound and technically skilled and the students will be given sufficient training in examining blood samples, body fluids, and other tissues samples. Students will take basic sciences courses that are applicable to medical lab technology. Candidates may specialise in medical microbiology, clinical biochemistry or haematology.

MASTER OF SCIENCE IN MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNOLOGY (MEDICAL MICROBIOLOGY) DURATION:2 years + 6 months internshipELIGIBILITY:3 years + internship

The MScMLT in Medical Microbiology is an allied health profession that specialises in microorganisms that cause disease. The role of the technologist in this field is to aid the doctor or medical microbiologist in detecting, diagnosing, and preventing diseases through clinical laboratory tests. In addition to running tests, technologists should also set up and maintain laboratory equipment. They also ensure that the laboratory is under the stipulated ambient conditions of temperature, humidity, quality control, safety, and sterility. The medical lab technician is trained to finish tasks with speed and accuracy, handle stress, make analytical judgments in interpreting technical or scientific data, use and maintain laboratory instrumentation, and become proficient in the use of computer hardware and software.

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The MSc MLT in Clinical Biochemistry is an allied health profession concerned with the diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of diseases through clinical laboratory tests. Medical laboratory professionals play a critical role in collecting the information needed to give the best care to an ailing or injured patient. Lab technologists are vital members of healthcare as the practice of modern medicine would be difficult without the tests performed in the laboratory.

Clinical biochemists specialise in diagnostics and therapeutics using their knowledge of biochemical and physiological functions of the human body. Owing to the increasing awareness among the general masses about health and hygiene and the mushrooming healthcare facilities and hospitals, the demand for such trained professionals is ever increasing and the programmes contributes to the effort to bridge the gap between demand and availability of these professionals.

Nutritionists and dietitians guide people about the diet that should be taken to improve their general health, avoid nutritionally related diseases, and maintain adequate nutrition during illness as adherence to a proper diet can aid in the speedy recovery from a disease.

The major role of dietitians is to assist people in planning a proper dietary intake depending on their age, work, or ailments. Nutritionists counsel individuals and groups, organise the food service systems in hospitals, schools, hotels and other institutions. They also specialise in education, research, administration, and clinical or community dietetics. This field finds application in medicine, veterinary, agriculture, and public health. Those graduates who meet the eligibility requirements may take the Registered Dieticians examination of the Indian Dietetic Association.

ABOUT THE PROGRAMME

The prime focus of the Masters of Arts in English Literature programme is to study culture vis-à-vis literature and to train students in the knowledge of literary theories as necessary tools to read narrative texts from various ideological perspectives. The engagement of colonialism with literary culture in India is too deep and invasive for the disciplinary expansion of English pedagogy to be studied with Britain as the only or chief focus.

Understanding the curriculum as an 'activity' rather than a repertoire of texts, this course aims to help students study texts in the context of the imperialist mission of Western hegemony. In light of this, the course structure encourages a sustained cross-referencing between histories of England and its colonies, thereby instilling a sense of appreciation of a people, their cultural beliefs, lifestyles, traditional practices, and forms of expression reflected through literary art forms. Indigenous literature, written in or translated to English, thus constitutes a major aspect of the course for a systematic and critical study of local cultures and aesthetics which otherwise, have been rather understudied, underappreciated and misrepresented in hegemonic narratives.

The MA (English) programme is for students who wish to pursue a course of study in the field of English Language Education (ELE). The Department was established in 2012 with a postgraduate programme in Environment and Social Development. In 2016, the Department introduced BSc in Environmental Sciences and BA in Environmental Studies.

The fact that environmental studies is multidisciplinary in nature and is intricately woven into the lives of tribal and indigenous people has led to special importance being accorded to traditional knowledge, culture and environment, and folklore.

The Department has also been engaging in the documentation of Khasi, Jaintia and Garo traditional medicine. To this end, it has been able to build an active networking with the traditional healers' community. The Department was also instrumental in drafting the Khasi Hills Autonomous District (Protection and Promotion of Khasi Traditional Medicine) Act, 2011 of the Khasi Hills District Autonomous Council, Meghalaya.

At present the Department is focused on undertaking studies and research work in the field of surface archaeology, speleology, palaeontology, waste management, and land reclamation. These research areas were selected with the objective of heritage conservation.

The Department presently offers Master of Science in Environmental Sciences (MSc ES) and Bachelor of Science in Environmental Science (BSc ES) The Department has six faculty members.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES (BSc ES)

DURATION:3 years (six semesters)ELIGIBILITY:+2 with scienceor any other stream (those from other streams will have a to take a bridge course in science)

ABOUT THE PROGRAMME

The Bachelor of Science in Environmental Sciences is designed to equip the students with knowledge, skills, and proficiencies to understand, identify and assess the qualitative, technical, anthropogenic and scientific components of environmental issues with the objective of protecting and conserving the environment at local, regional, national and global levels. The programme also provides students with skills to critically analyse different environmental problems and apply globally and nationally acceptable standards aligned with local conditions.

The programmewill provide an understanding of scientific principles and factors, both natural and man-made, that impact the environment. The programme will impart practical skills to students by exposing them to field, laboratory, and community conditions. Students will also be trained in the fields of ecology, physical and chemical environment, environmental monitoring and assessment, and community

participation. This programme is structured in a manner that will allow students to be familiar with global issues, tools for management and decision making, environmental laws and policies, thereby, enabling them to utilise their skills towards environmental sustainability. A special component of the course is the focus on tribal and environment perspectives in the form of case studies of environment-friendly traditional methods.

This programme trains students in various interdisciplinary thinking skills and provides them with the ability to study and understand the environmental and sustainability issues with special emphasis on the ones faced by Northeast India. The course includes the biological and social matters concurrent with current environmental issues, conservation strategies, legal frameworks, ecological concerns, and technological advances.

- develop a deeper understanding of environmental issues by relating scientific knowledge with environmental, social,

MBA in Waste Management and Social Entrepreneurship is a programme approved by Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education (MGNCRE), MHRD, GoI. Waste generation is one of the major problems faced by the world in general and India in particular due to its population. At present, 62 million tonnes of waste is generated annually in the country, out of which about 75-80 per cent of the municipal waste gets collected and only 22-28 per cent of this waste is processed and treated. Waste to resource has been a concept in place but the actual implementation in India is still very limited. There is a huge market that can be tapped through entrepreneurship. As per the Waste to Energy and Waste Management Market in India -2019 Report it is expected that the Indian garbage will offer business opportunity of USD 14 billion by 2025, which is set to unlock new business avenues in the waste treatment industry.

wNeedless to say that waste management and social entrepreneurship is a win-win approach and a way forward. The course will equip students to find solutions for the increasing waste management problem which will also serve as a career for them. 



MISSION STATEMENT

Despite many advancements in the medical field, there is a significant lag in public health in India. Creation of dedicated public health cadres has been identified as one of the important initiatives in moving towards improved health systems.

The National Health Policy 2017 of the Government of India, section 11.8 recommends the creation of a "Public Health Management Cadre in all States". The policy also advocates an appropriate career structure and recruitment policy to attract young and talented multidisciplinary professionals. Medical and health professionals would form a major part of this, but professionals coming in from diverse backgrounds such as sociology, economics, anthropology, nursing, hospital management, communications, etc. who have since undergone public health management training would also be considered. States could decide to locate these public health managers, with medical and non-medical qualifications, into the same or different cadre streams belonging to Directorates of Health.

MASTER OF PUBLIC HEALTH (MPH)

DURATION: 2 years (four semesters)

ELIGIBILITY: MBBS, BDS, BAMS, BHMS, BUMS, Bachelor of Naturopathy & Yogic Sciences (BNYS), Bachelor of Siddha Medicine and Surgery (BSMS), BTech or BE (any branch) and graduates of fouryear degree programme in veterinary sciences, nursing, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, pharmacy, or apostgraduate degree in statistics, demography, population studies, nutrition, sociology, economics, psychology, anthropology, social work, management, or law. Work experience in a health-related field is desirable.

Along with the application form, candidates are required to submit a 500-750 word essay on "Why I wish to do an MPH" and also discuss a public health issue of relevance to India.

OVERVIEW OF THE COURSE

The MPH course will prepare a competent cadre of professionals who have a basic understanding of the various aspects of public health and are able to successfully apply this knowledge towards meeting public health challenges in the Indian context.

The Master of Science in Biostatistics & Epidemiology course will prepare students in biostatistical methods for study design, data analysis, statistical reporting, data management, statistical reasoning and reporting. Graduates of the programmewill be prepared for careers as biostatisticians in a variety of professional environments including government, academics, healthcare, research organizations and industry.

Biostatistics involves the theory and application of statistical science to address issues in health sciences, including medicine and public health. It uses quantitative research methods for analysing health problems. Epidemiology is the study of the distribution and determinants of health-related states or events (including

disease), and the application of this study to the control of diseases and other health problems. It is a quantitative discipline built on the research disciplines of probability science and statistics. It involves methods of causal reasoning based on developing and testing hypotheses pertaining to the occurrence and prevention of morbidity and mortality. Methods developed by biostatisticians and epidemiologists are used to plan population surveys and to optimally design interventions to collect data which allow valid conclusions to be drawn. Biostatisticians and epidemiologists play a role in designing research studies, monitoring data quality, analysing data, interpreting the results and making inferences based on the data.

The program is intentional about helping students discern their vocation through seminars, small groups and vocational counselling and professional development electives in areassuch as Christian Leadership and Management; Religion, Violence and Peacebuilding; and Women, Children and Youth Ministries and Women's Studies in Theology and Ministry. Internships provide students to tailor their course of study to meet specific learning goals, to gain more experience in a particular aspect of ministry or to obtain exposure to a broader range of vocational pathways and professional opportunities. Students may intern with a church, an agency, or an existing internship program according to their specific interest. MA in Theology at MLCU It is a two-year, academic degree covering four semesters and one summer internships and concurrent, practical work, in the chosen areas of Christian ministry plus a thesis or an integrative essay within the selected area of specialisation.

It provides women and men with the opportunity to pursue advanced studies in Christian life and Ministry by research in the context of professional practice with supporting specialised coursework.

DMIN TO PHD

A candidate with a DMin may pursue a PhD that will take a minimum of one year, provided the research study is based on, or a continuation of the DMin research project.

ABOUT MARTIN LUTHER CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY

CREATION OF THE UNIVERSITY

Martin Luther Christian University was created by Act No. 11 of 2005 of the Legislative Assembly of Meghalaya and received the assent of the Governor on July 6, 2005. The Government of Meghalaya issued the gazette notification on February 22, 2006. The creation of the university is in accordance with the University Grants Commission (UGC) Act, 1956 under Section 2(f) and the university is empowered to grant degrees under Section 22 of the UGC Act.

MLCU is recognised by the UGC vide a notification and the University has been granted Reg. No. 28.

Several students and graduates of MLCU have been awarded JRF, NET and merit scholarships by the UGC. Many graduates of MLCU are pursuing their higher studies in universities and institutions in different parts of the country and abroad.

THE FIRST CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY

Martin Luther Christian University is the first full-fledged Christian University in India, the capstone to more than two centuries of Christian education in this country. As a Christian university, MLCU has the mandate, mission and commitment to engage proactively with the Christian community, especially youth, Christian educational institutions and Christian organizations.

A DEVELOPMENTAL UNIVERSITY

The University recognises its opportunity and responsibility to contribute to the sustainable development of Meghalaya and the Northeast region, participating not only in higher education, but also in vocational education, health care, information and communication networks, environmental conservation, gender studies, cultural documentation, peace building and interventional projects. The University collaborates with NGOs, community organisations, and industry in the development of the community.

THE NAME

The University is named after Martin Luther (1483-1546), a church reformer who is known as the Father of Protestantism. Though Martin Luther left law studies to become a monk , his enlightened views on education are quoted to this day. He was especially concerned about "parents who do not have the opportunity or means to educate their children". His sermon on "Keeping children in schools" later published as a treatise, focused on low-income families who needed their children to work rather than go to school. He laid emphasis on the establishment and maintenance of Christian Schools in response to a decline in the church run schools in the 16thcentury.

THE EMBLEM

The University Emblem comprises of the Knup, the Cross and the Hearth. The Knup is a traditional woven bamboo cane cape used as a protection against rain when working in the field so rout in the open. The Knup symbolises protection and nurture in the journey through hardship to gain knowledge. In the centre of the Knup, is the Cross which is the symbol of Christianity and denotes sacrifice and endurance. At the base of the Knup is the Hearth with burning fire which occupies an important place in tribal houses. It is a place where parents and elders gather to instruct, narrate stories and sing songs while imparting the cultural and traditional knowledge of the forefathers to the younger generation.

THE MOTTO

Noted poet, historian and archeologist George Fabricius (1516- 1571) eulogised the Protestant Reformist, Martin Luther as "The Light of Truth." Martin Luther Christian University's motto has emerged from this praise of the Father of Protestantism. According to Fabricius, truth is a light that illuminates, educates and edifies.

THE MISSION STATEMENT

To contribute to the sustainable development of Meghalaya and Northeast India, by providing knowledge, skills and values that will enable our students to become global citizens, while upholding gender, ethnic and religious equity for all, conserving its bio-cultural heritage and by recognising its Christian legacy and commitment.

VISION

Christian education and values for the betterment of society, especially its youth and Christian community.

The Vision of the University has encapsulated the mandate and commitment of the Founders of the University, which have been recorded verbatim in the Minutes of the first meeting of the Board of Governors and is extracted as below: "The role and responsibility of the church is to transform society in a manner that is relevant in today's context. The process of transformation must come about in such a way that it solves the problems of unemployment among young people, poverty, health, education and development. The university has come at the right time and should help our people to help themselves. Our state has rich potential in nature and the university should help to tap these resources in a proper way. The university should be rooted in the local culture."

"The university should help to define the role of the church in this society. It should serve the people of Meghalaya. Historically, the church has provided school and higher education in Meghalaya, but the university will be the crown of our educational efforts in Meghalaya. The praxis of faith, grace and scripture is education."



A. PROGRAMMES

The diploma and degree programmes that MLCU offer are livelihood, career, and entrepreneurial centred. They are oriented to the development needs of the state, region, and country.

CURRICULUM AND PEDAGOGY	The curriculum is experiential, not didactic, dynamic, not static, and competency-based rather than theoretical. It de-emphasises lectures and examinations and instead provides complementary knowledge and skills. It is oriented to the context of indigenous history, culture, and issues. It also seeks to create awareness and stimulate advocacy and community activity. It offers minors, specialisations and a multi-disciplinary liberal education approach.
STUDENT CENTRED	The academic programmes emphasise learning rather than teaching and provides students with hands-on experiences. It acknowledges their individual differences, backgrounds, and abilities. The University uses multiple an innovative methods of learning and provides a friendly and supportive environment. The academic assessment of student learning is achieved by continuous formative evaluation to shift the focus from assessment of learning to assessment for learning. Career guidance and career preparation are provided.
RESEARCH	The research is community-based and relevant to the development of society. Emphasis is given to interventional, community-participative programmes, cultural rootedness and the revitalisation of indigenous knowledge so as to benefit and strengthen traditional, transitional, and contemporary communities.
ACADEMIC Structures	The University follows a two-semester academic calendar. The syllabus is delivered in the form of credits and the evaluation of students uses grades and grade point average.

B. CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)

In line with UGC recommendations, the University follows the Choice Based Credit System for all undergraduate students. Under CBCS, students choose a Specialisation (18 credits) within the department and a Minor (12 credits) from another department.

Under the CBCS scheme, a minor is an aggregate of 12 credits taken by an undergraduate student in another department.

C. FOUNDATION COURSE

Life span development is the field of studyt hat examines patterns of growth, change, and stability in behaviour that occur throughout an individual's lifespan.Lifespan development focuses on humandevelopment and views development as a continuous, lifelong process. Lifespan development uses a scientific approach to understanding human growth and change throughout life and encompasses physical, cognitive, social, and personality development. Culture and ethnicity also play an important role in development, that is, both culture in the broad sense and aspects of culture, such as race, ethnicity, and socio economic status.

The period of young adulthood is characterised by:

- potential for high performance, more than at any other stage of life. It also highlights the role and importance of cultural learning as an example of lifelong development.
- physical development of puberty that is completed during this phase. Health and fitness are often a concern, including attention to proper nutrition, junk foods, and overweight.
- experimentation with and usage of drugs and drinking are often a feature of new-found independence. Efforts to enhance mental and psychological well- being are important to reduce inherent stresses of this phase of life.
- the expansion of the networks of friendships as new social relationships are made away from home. These friendships sometimes become more important than family in the maintenance of sound mental health. Shared altruism and idealism may lead to group volunteerism, strengthening social integration.
- moral reasoning and ethical codes that reach the highest stage of development between 20-22 years of age.
- ethnicity, identity and growing awareness of one's cultural roots that result in a healthy balance of cultural self-confidence, respect for diversity, and a complete sense of self.
- heterosexual relationships. In MLCU, a study has shown that more than half of students are in a relationship. There are prejudices or openness about issues such as pornography, premarital sex, abortion, rape, and alternative sexual orientations, depending on upbringing and the influences of religion, peers, and media. Concerns arise about contraception, sexually-transmitted diseases, and sexual harassment.
- careerdecision-making including theneed to select disciplines of study and specialisations. Cultural, social and gender beliefs influence the choice of careers, as does peer influences. Goals in life need to be formulated so that study choices are aligned accordingly.

The Foundation Course will provide awareness and engagement with all these issues that young adults face and will provide academic, social, and psychological support during this important phase of life and university education.

D. EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Knowledgeis effectively created through experience. Knowledge results from the combination of grasping and transforming experience. It is distinct from rote or didactic learning, in which the learner plays a comparatively passive role. The University Grants Commission encourages the use of experiential learning stating that, "Learners must have ample scope to formulate their own queries and have multiple interpretations of knowledge through self-search and experiential learning." To emphasise the importance of experiential learning, MLCU encourages the broad use of experiential strategies and tools, recommending that at least half of the learning time be spent in experiential learning.

E. SELF-DIRECTED LEARNING (SDL)

The UGC Guidelines for Master's degrees has the following provision: "The students shall be encouraged to study some part of the syllabus themselves and shall be given assignments, so as to make use of the library, laboratory, internet and such other faculty." Self-learning is any study form in which individuals have primary responsibility for planning, implementing, and even evaluating thee ffort. Most people prefer self-learning to teacher-directed learning. In self-directed learning:

Individual learners become empowered to take more responsibility for decisions associated with learning

- 1. Self-direction creates a continuum of learning
- 2. Self-learning can take place in collaboration with others
- 3. Self-directed learners are able to transfer learning from one situation to another
- 4. Self-directed learning can effectively be conducted through various activities: self-guide dreading,
- outcomes

- 5. participation in study groups, internships, electronic dialogues, and reflective writing
- 6. Effective roles for teachers are possible: dialogue with learners, helping with sources and resources, promoting critical thinking and evaluating

7. Innovative programmes maybe created/conducted such as: individualised study options, non-traditional course offerings, open learning programmes, computer-mediated instruction and others.

8. "Most important of all, self-directed learningworks!"



Self-directed learning, in its broadest meaning, describes a process in which individuals take the initiative, with or without the help of others, in diagnosing their learning needs, formulating learning goals, identifying resources for learning, choosing and implementing learning strategies, and evaluating learning outcomes.

In self-directed learning, learners themselves take the initiative to use resources rather than simply reacting to transmissions from resources, which helps them learn more and in a better way. Lifelong, self- directedlearning(SDL)hasbeenidentifiedasanimportantabilityforgraduates. Ithasbeenshownthrough manystudiesworldwidethattheself-directedmethodisbetterthantheteachercentricmethodoflearning. Teacher-directe dlearningmakeslearnersmoredependentandtheorientationtolearningbecomessubject-centred. If a teacher provides the learning material, the student is usually satisfied with the available material, whereasifastudentisaskedtoworkonone's own, heorsheinvariably hastoexplore extensive resources on thesubject.

F. EXTERNAL INTERNSHIPS

As part of experiential learning, internships are encouraged and supported in MLCU in that all departments have internships. The strongest internship programme in terms of duration and learning is in the AHS department. Most AHS students have found the internship to be approximative experience. A transformative experience will be to come about from an immersive internship which serves several purposes:

- 1. Experience in hands-onskills
- 2. Develop attributes of confidence, maturity, and agency
- 3. Demonstrate analytical, critical reflection, and decision-makingskills
- 4. Develop interactive skills with other professionals in the field
- 5. Become more familiar with the world ofwork
- 6. Obtain cross-cultural experiences

"External internship" is one that is conducted away from the place of student origin. It may include internships that have been arranged by individual students, but generally will encompass a group of institutions and organisations with which MLCU has established a formal relationship. These arrangements will be academically and administratively structured for optimal learning experience.

G. CONTINUOUS FORMATIVE EVALUATION (CFE)

Continuous formative evaluation refers to any form of frequent assessment, such as tests, essays, projects, interviews, or presentations that are conducted during the course with the goal of giving students early and continuous feedback on their performance, so as to help the student correct gaps and improve during the semester. In contrast, summative evaluation is a final evaluation about the quality of performance conducted at the end of the course, such as a final examination. CFE is used at MLCU.

H. RESEARCH

Through evidence-based research, the University can develop innovations in enhancing pedagogy within the university and the initiatives in the community. As the university focuses on upholding the heritage and culture of our students, the Research Office has laid emphasis on documentation of valuable indigenous knowledge systems and cultural practices that are in danger of decline and extinction. The Research Office would also look at translating culturally important documents of various tribes which could then be widely disseminated. Although the research studies undertaken are of local problems and concerns, the findings and their implications should be applicable to a wider audience at the national and the international level.





STUDENT SERVICES

CAREER COUNSELLING

Career Counseling facilitates students to explore the world of employment and career avenues and assist them in career planning. They gather information about their interests, aptitudes, and abilities so that they can choose their careers more effectively. It provides students with a platform to meet experienced professionals in relevant fields and learn, through listening and interacting, they chart out their career path and long-term goals. CareeR Counseling thus serves to effectively match and balance the personal abilities, interests, and situation soft he student with the external factors of employability and courses thus helping them prioritise and choose the best available option. Career counselling programmes are conducted every semester and are provided to all students.

COUNSELLING CELL

Martin Luther Christian University is committed to the holistic development of students. The Counselling Cell provides support to the students in the areas of their academic development as well as their personal issues. Students are encouraged to attend counselling sessions as and when needed in order to overcome challenges that they may have with confidence, courage, integrity and various others. The Counselling Cell aims to equip students with skills to transform adversities into opportunities for excellence.

GENDER STUDIES, REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND LIFE SKILLS EDUCATION

Life skills have been defined by the World Health Organization as 'the abilities for adaptive and positive behaviour that enable individuals to deal effectively with the demand and changes of everyday life'. These skills help to promote social, emotional and mental well-being and competency for young people to face the realities of life. Life Skills include communication and listening skills; negotiation and refusal skills; decision-making and problem solving skills; and coping and self-management skills. Students trained in these areas display an improved self- esteem and the ability to manage feelings and stress.

The International Guidelines on Sexuality Education (UNESCO, 2009) defines sexuality education as "an age-appropriate, culturally sensitive and comprehensive approach to sexuality education that includes scientifically accurate, realistic and non-judgmental information." Comprehensive sexuality education provides opportunities to explore one's own values and attitudes and to build

decision-making, communication, and risk reduction skills on aspects of sexuality. Comprehensive sexuality education promotes critical thinking, self-actualisation, and behavioural change through knowledge about the body, healthy sexuality, relationships, sex abuse, pregnancy, HIV and sexually transmitted infection prevention; and many other topics in human sexuality and sexual and reproductive health and rights.

MLCU conducts a workshop on "Gender studies, reproductive health and life skills education" for all undergraduate and postgraduate students. The workshop is held over four days. The course is broadly divided into three sections, namely gender, reproductive health, and life skills education. The life skills team consists of certified facilitators from health, social work, and psychology background.

LIBRARY

The University has both Central and Departmental libraries. The main library is housed in the main campus and is accessible to all the students and staff of MLCU and the departmental libraries are located in the respective departments and accessible to students and staff of those departments. The Library is equipped with computers and internet facilities for the students to browse for reading materials related to their studies. It also has photo copying and spiral-binding facilities. The University subscribes to JSTOR, a digital library for scholars, researchers, and students through which over 10 million academic journals, books, articles, and primary sources in 75 disciplines can be accessed.

MLCU SCHOLARSHIPS

MLCU offers various Merit-Cum-Means Scholarships to its students and has set up what is known as the MLCU Scholarship Fund (MLCUSF). The objective of the MLCUSF is to provide financial assistance to MLCU students on a merit-cum-means basis. To be eligible for a scholarship, a student must be registered in a full-time degree or diploma course and should have completed at least one year of the course. Regular attendance and academic progress are also taken into consideration when determining the award of scholarship. There are 30 scholarships offered every year from the MLCU Scholarship Fund. ADMISSION POLICY

According to the MLCU Act 2005, Section 9, "The University shall be open to all persons irrespective of class, caste, creed, religion, language or gender, provided that nothing in this section shall be deemed to require the University from making special provisions for admission to students of the State."

In accordance with the Act, the University shall admit:

> Students from the State of Meghalava and the Northeast region shall ordinarily be given preference. All admissions to MLCU are based primarily on the following criteria:

> Fulfilling the minimum eligibility required to pursue undergraduate and postgraduate studies. The admission is on a first come first serve basis (Spot Admission). No percentage is set up as a criterion for admissions to the courses in MLCU at both UG and PG levels.

> Provisional admission may be granted, which gives the opportunity to students who are unable to fulfill admission criteria as below:

Students who have a minimum number of failures in the qualifying examination and are re-appearing. These will be considered on an individual basis.

Paid the fees partially

This is applicable for a period of six months to one year: During this period, applicants are to fulfill the deficiency failing which their registration will be temporarily suspended or cancelled as applicable. After the period has lapsed, applicants are to submit an application indicating reasons of inability to fulfill the conditions for further consideration and decision about continuation or termination.

In cases where applicants do not complete the standard+2(arts, science, commerce) courses of studies, admissions to undergraduate programmes may be considered based on 12 years of relevant education. Admissions to postgraduate programmes may be given on the basis of completion of 10+2+3 years duration of relevant studies.
